ADF Pay Case Offer

The Defence Force Remuneration Tribunal will take submissions on the forthcoming ADF Workplace Remuneration Arrangements on the 16th of August. Because the matter is being dealt under Section 58KD of the Defence Act, the Tribunal's role in this matter will be limited to either accepting the proposal, or not: in other words, it may not alter its provisions. If it accepts it, ADF members will receive a 2% pay rise from November 2017, and a further 2% pa for a further two years. If it rejects the proposal the whole pay rise issue will need to be reconsidered by the parties, which would mean a significant delay. The Tribunal is expected to make a decision before November.

Goodbye Squirrel and Seahawk Bravo

On Friday 01 Dec this year the FAA will farewell two stalwarts in the form of the S-70B-2 Seahawk Bravo and the Aerospatiale AS350BA Squirrel helicopters from service with the Royal Australian Navy. These aircraft have served this nation well and a 'send off' fitting to their place in history will take place at HMAS Albatross.

The S-70B-2 has just completed the last operational deployment with the return of Flight 3 Bravo from the Middle East which marks almost 30 years of continued 816 Squadron Bravo operational deployments (the 816 Romeo period has already begun with the second Middle East deployment already underway). has or will transition to the MH-60R Seahawk Romeo, however Bravo operations aimed at providing limited Fleet Support will continue from the Squadron up to 01 Dec 17.

The Squirrel is still being used to train aircrew so there is no RDP for her as the last pilot's course completes just prior to transition of training to the EC135.

Final plans for the farewell are yet to mature however there will be an official ceremony and parade mid-morning on **Friday 01 Dec 17** to formally conclude the service of these two types, followed by a ticketed Cocktail Party that evening. It is hoped as many of the Bravo and Squirrel family can make it as the CTP will provide a relaxed environment for all serving and former members who have stories and experiences to tell of the aircraft in operational and training spheres. Fifty-Five Years Ago



Last month's 'Fly By' image was taken from Slipstream number 70, dated May 1953. Thank you to **Barry White**, **Joe Pollard** and '**Dutchy' Brauer** who all gave the correct answer.

The image shows what was then called 'The Wessex Underwater Escape Trainer' which is probably the first 'Dunker' in the RAN. It was supposed to represent the rear cabin of the 31A and was constructed of light galvanized Dexlon angle steel – so light, in fact, that seven pressed men were required to carry it to the pool and back again.

Once in the pool, the rig remained static – unlike more modern dunkers that rotate. The windows were covered with canvas and weighted down with lead bars. The door, though which the trainee entered, was one way only – in – so the idea was that once inside you submerged yourself before exiting though the window. Hardly the stuff of nightmares, but better than no training at all.

Once this dunker disappeared, the RAN appears not to have had one at all for a while. It relied on third party dunkers as they became available, including one designed by me when I was working with the National Safety Council of Victoria (it was a Bell 206 fuselage stuck on a rotating pole).

The redevelopment of HMAS Albatross provided the funding to set that right, and the RAN now operates one of the most modern facilities in the southern hemisphere. It comprises a mock fuselage/cockpit that is dropped into a pool and rotated, to simulate a ditching/roll over. See photo above right, courtesy of the RAN. Check out the old and the new!
